Commercial Law LLB Honours

This course is a Qualifying Law Degree, providing you with the core subjects required by the professional legal bodies, which will grant exemptions for those who wish to become solicitors or barristers. The course will help you to find suitable commercial work experience either with a law firm or with a corporate legal department, providing you with first-hand experience of private practice or the services provided by an in-house legal team.

Course content

All modules are double modules. The option modules are geared towards commercial law and commercial legal practice.

European Legal Studies LLB Honours

This course encourages an interest in the European dimension of law. On graduation you will have satisfied Law Society/Bar Council requirements and spent a year studying law in another European country. As a Qualifying Law Degree, graduates who wish to become barristers or solicitors are granted exemptions by the professional bodies concerned. You need to demonstrate an aptitude for European language study, but this need not necessarily take the form of a formal qualification.

Course content

You will study a European language in Year 1 and Year 2 (Credit Levels 4 and 5) so that you can cope with studying in another European country. You will then spend 12 months studying law at one of the universities in the European Union that maintain links with the School of Law. These offer a wide range of law courses, including some taught in English. We have partner institutions in Belgium, France, Germany, Italy, the Netherlands, Spain and Sweden. This scheme allows you to experience another legal culture, develop links in Europe, and gain knowledge of other legal systems, while studying for a Qualifying Law Degree.

Law LLB Honours

This course provides you with the core subjects required by the professional legal bodies. In addition, you will be able to study a wide range of distinctive modules, many of which reflect the research interests of the staff. The legal professions require graduates to possess both intellectual and practical skills, and the course explicitly addresses these requirements with a structured programme of skills development.

You will experience a range of teaching and learning methods, and the course attracts students from a variety of backgrounds with different life experiences, making the School a stimulating and enriching environment.

Course content

The course commences with a compulsory short induction course to the University, the School and the study of law. You will study core subjects together with law options and free choice modules (not all options are offered in the evening). The free choice modules provide opportunities for you to study options outside of the School, for example a language or a social science module. As you progress through the course you will receive guidance about your choice of modules. There are also specific pathways that you can follow.

Direct entry

Direct entry to Year 2 or Year 3 (Credit Level 5 or 6) is possible if you have already successfully completed a course compatible with Year 1 (Credit Level 4), or Year 1 and Year 2 (Credit Levels 4 and 5) of our LLB. Please note that we may not be able to make decisions on direct entry applicants until all your previous results are available. Direct entrants are expected to have achieved good results prior to their application to transfer.

Those wishing to transfer directly on to Year 2 or Year 3 (Credit Level 5 or 6) of the course should check their proposed programme of study with the appropriate professional body to ensure that they are eligible for a Qualifying Law Degree. Teaching and assessment

Lectures, used for large groups, are supported by smaller seminar or tutorial sessions. You will develop the skills of independent study and research. You will be assessed using a variety of methods ranging from presentations and essays to formal exams. Most subjects have some element of course work that, in some modules, accounts for all of the mark.

Law with French Law LLB Honours

This course gives students the opportunity to spend a year studying law in France, gaining invaluable experience of another legal culture while acquiring knowledge of its language and legal system.

Course content

You will study modules to ensure you are able to obtain a Qualifying Law Degree, as well as a wide range of law option modules. In addition to French language modules, you will study French law and legal language. Between Year 2 and Year 3 (Credit Levels 5 and 6) you will spend 12 months at a French university and study law in French, giving you the opportunity to obtain a French legal qualification. Arrangements exist between the University of Westminster and the universities of Nancy, Bordeaux, Nice and Paris X Nanterre, and you will not be charged tuition fees during your year abroad. You will develop links in Europe and emerge with an LLB which satisfies the professional bodies.

Solicitor's Exempting LLB Honours

This course is a Qualifying Law Degree, and graduates who wish to become solicitors are also exempt from The Law Society's requirement to take a Legal Practice Course (LPC). The course incorporates a first degree in law and the LPC, and will be offered from 2009/10, subject to confirmation from the Solicitors Regulation Authority (SRA).

The course is geared to professional practice in a law firm, with first year modules introducing some of the skills developed and assessed in the LPC. It prepares you for clinical experience in Year 3 and clinical options in Year 4, where you will work with real clients. Fees are consistent throughout rather than nearly tripling at the LPC stage, and students who decide not to qualify as solicitors may opt for a simple Qualifying Law Degree on successfully completing Year 3.

Course content

The course was approved under the new framework for the delivery of 'LPC III'. It is one of only four such courses in the country, and the only one in London and the South East. The course combines the core of a Qualifying Law Degree with preparation for the work of a solicitor. The two modules in Legal Ethics, Method and Skills provide students with an introduction to professional ethics and skills, together with the traditional study skills course. This is followed by training to conduct cases with real clients in Year 3 and the option to do clinical work (live cases) in Year 4. The course provides clinical work or placements, although students can find their own work placements if they wish. Most modules are double modules.

Teaching and assessment

Lectures are supported by seminars or tutorials. You will develop independent study and research skills, and will be assessed using a variety of methods including presentations, essays and formal exams. Most subjects have some element of course work that, in some modules, accounts for all of the mark.

Associated careers

The degree is geared to qualification as a solicitor. On completion you will complete a period of work-based learning (currently called a training contract) under the supervision of a solicitor approved by the SRA. There are a wide variety of career options as a solicitor, from private practice in commercial firms in the City of London or high street firms, to being an employed lawyer with organisations such as the Crown Prosecution Service and the legal departments of major corporations. Law graduates are also sought after in a wide range of non-legal careers. Students completing the course, or those choosing to leave with a Qualifying Law Degree after three years, can also begin to train as a barrister.
